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Church Action on Poverty 14th Annual Pilgrimage

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Introduction

heffield is still recovering from the dislocation that the Covid 19 pandemic had on the charitable sector, and, specifically, on those who work on poverty alleviation initiatives. It is a city with many experiencing extreme hardship due to the cost of living crisis.

So, it is essential that a voluntary support network is in place to help those who are experiencing poverty in their lives.

With this in mind, Sheffield's Church Action on Poverty aims to promote the work being undertaken by these voluntary initiatives across the city's church sector and wider afield, including, on occasion, undertaking political lobbying on a local and national level.

For those who may be unfamiliar with the work of Church Action on Poverty, we are a national ecumenical Christian social justice charity committed to tackling poverty in the UK.

We work in partnership with churches, with people living in poverty, and with those who work with people living in poverty, to tackle its root causes, and we aim to put gospel values of social justice a n d compassion into practice.

information gathered at our annual Poverty Pilgrimage that took place on the south side of Sheffield on 21st October, 2023, and on a small number of Internet sources relating to the projects that we visited.

This pilgrimage took place on the day after Storm Babet had caused serious flooding in Chesterfield and parts of Sheffield.

We went ahead despite this, but understandably numbers were less than in previous years.

Twenty one pilgrims set forth on this pilgrimage and encountered no problems resulting from the storm.

Every year we visit a different area of Sheffield to learn about how poverty is affecting people in the city, and about the alleviation efforts that are in place to mitigate the effects it is having on the poorest members of our society. This year we visited:

- St James, Norton an Anglican church with interesting initiatives for young people and parents to be.
- The work of the **Grace Food** Bank, based at the Michael United Reformed Church, which provides help for people in need in Lowedges, Norton, Batemoor, Jordanthorpe and the surrounding areas.
- The Terminus Initiative -acommunity project that provides support through volunteering, health & social groups, education, and a range of other mental and physical well being and poverty relief interventions.
- The work of St Peter's, Greenhill — an Anglican church that supports a range of local initia-

tives, including providing School Pastors and the Makerspace project to help young people build confidence through practical hobbies and activities.

For this year, our Poverty Pilgrimage was also part of the national 'Let's End Poverty' campaign.

This is a campaign that is focused on influencing those in positions of power to focus on the cause of ending poverty, as we embark on the run-up to the next general election.

By building a movement of people who take action to push poverty higher up the agenda, we want to send the message loud and clear that the next generation has to be free from the appalling injustice of poverty.

For this to be a reality, we need our leaders to commit to structural change and political action.



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Places that we visited

ST JAMES CHURCH, NORTON



st James Church is a parish church of England. It is an ancient and beautiful church that serves the

community of Norton, Batemoor and Jordanthorpe, along with its ecumenical partners at Meadowhead Christian Fellowship.

It describes itself as a broad and inclusive church with a strong musical tradition that offers a warm welcome to all who wish to share in the journey of faith.

It is particularly strong on organising activities for young people. These include craft days, take-away activity bags, parties, treasure hunts, photography competitions, book swaps, pancake toss...to name just a few.

It also runs a Bumps to 3 group that meets every Tuesday and Thursday, except in school holidays, from 10 am to 11.30am.

This is for parents-to-be, new parents and grandparents to meet and discuss issues relating to childcare and development, and is a popular wellbeing intervention for the local community that it serves. There are toys, craft activities, and refreshments provided for the children that accompany parents, as well as hospitality for the adults who attend.

GRACE FOOD BANK SHEFFIELD helping give hope to those in need

race Food Bank is a community group covering the Sheffield 8 postcode area: Lowedges, Norton, Batemoor, Jordanthorpe and the surrounding areas.

It provides food parcels to families or individuals who find themselves in short term financial crisis.

It also provides a signposting service for people living in poverty and who are seeking help with debt management, gambling addiction, substance abuse and other social challenges related to living in poverty.

Grace Food Bank works closely with the Lilies Clothes Bank based in Jordanthrorpe shopping precinct.

Jackie Butcher, who has managed the Food Bank for 9 years, showed us the bar chart (overleaf), which demonstrates

the dramatic increase in demand for the Food Bank's services in the last year or so.

This shows how severely the cost of living crisis has affected less affluent communities in our City, and also suggests that the UK's social security safety net is now ineffective for many people.

The food bank is always in need of additional food supplies and financial donations that will enable it to purchase food, and for volunteers.

THE TERMINUS INITIATIVE

he Terminus Initiative is a Christian charity that aims to provide a range of support services to its local community.

Working in partnership with other groups, it works hard to support & empower people living in Lowedges, Batemoor & Jordanthorpe.

It does this through supported volunteering, health groups, conversation and other social groups, education, mental and emotional wellbeing initiatives, practical poverty relief and more.

It is an excellent meeting place, with a community library, and offers spiritual and practical support to those who seek it.

Particularly important is their involvement in the 'People keeping well' initiative, in partnership with Sheffield City Council.

Although the area surrounding the project is considered deprived by many

measures, it is rich in community spirit and neighbourliness.

ST PETER'S, GREENHILL

aint Peters is an Anglican church serving Greenhill and Lowedges. It provides a wide range of services and other social activities, including lunch clubs, mum and toddler groups, family Eucharist services, and other prayer and creativity services to the local community.

It is committed to helping those experiencing poverty to have a voice in their church and wider afield.

A key focus is on providing a range of local initiatives, including providing School Pastors who have built up excellent relationships with the local school community and who offer educational and pastoral interventions to them.

It also provides the Makerspace project, which helps young people build confidence through nurturing them to engage in practical hobbies and other creative activities with others, with an emphasis on collaborative working.

Louise Haigh, MP for this area, spoke to us, expressing concern that Sheffield continued to suffer from low pay and deprivation. She saw a need for action on the minimum wage and on health and housing. She praised the various church initiatives in her constituency for the love and concern that they showed.
